



The Stradavari Formula William "Grit" Laskin



THE STRADIVARI FORMULA evokes writers as diverse as Louise Penny, Alan Furst, and Dan Brown, presenting us with a warm-hearted, humanitarian worldview, a superbly-researched look into a fascinating milieu, and a stunning historical secret. The plot of the novel revolves around guitars, considered by many to be the world's most popular instrument. Anyone who has ever held a guitar is sure to be fascinated by this unique thriller.

Add to this mix the odd anomaly that Stradivari didn't just build violins, he also made a small number of guitars. No more than five of these exist today.

In preparation for a major musical instrument exhibit at Canada's National Gallery, a problem is discovered on one of these Stradivari guitars. The two luthiers--guitarmakers--given the task of handling the repair discover something unusual buried in the neck: a hidden fragment of a written formula, rolled into a small glass tube. The fragment's cryptic text is in period Latin.

The discovery of this hidden fragment begins a cascade of events as the search is on for the rest of the formula, a journey that takes our characters to London, Paris, Phoenix, Ottawa, and the island of Sardinia.

Unbeknownst to our protagonist, an average 60-year-old who happens to be a guitar maker, there is someone who is intent on keeping the formula hidden, and prepared to use any means possible to achieve his goal. Our protagonist faces repeated challenges and violence, not just to himself but to his family and friends. Connections in London, and well as the MI6 Art & Antiquities Fraud division assist in the hunt.

Where are the other fragments? If they can be found and revealed, what is the actual formula? And what does it actually do? Why are Russian hackers interested? And how does the world's most valuable stolen painting become involved?

Right from the prologue we learn that someone is prepared to do murderous harm in order to obtain the formula, and to stop it from becoming known.

William "Grit" Laskin, wears many hats. His primary one is that of guitarmaker. His steelstring, classical and flamenco guitars are known and coveted around the world, and his current waiting list of commissions is 4 years long.

In 1997, he received Canada's prestigious Saidye Bronfman Award For Excellence, the first and only instrument maker to be so honoured. He is also an elected fellow of the Royal Canadian Academy of the Arts. In 2010 he was awarded the Estelle Klein Lifetime Achievement for his contributions to Folk Music. In 2012 he was named to the Order of Canada.

An additional but related hat Laskin wears is that of musician/songwriter/singer. For over 50 years he has been a multi-instrumentalist performer of music. He continues to give occasional concerts at clubs and music festivals across Canada and the northern US. He has recorded four solo albums of original music.

In 1996 Laskin, in partnership with Ken Whitely, Paul Mills and Bill Garrett founded Borealis Records, Canada's first national Folk Music label.

Laskin's final hat is that of author. In 2003 he published *A Guitar Maker's Canvas: The Inlay Art* of *Grit Laskin.* In 1996 he published his first novel, *Angel Could Smell the Fire.* His first published book (1987) was a celebration and documenting of Toronto's thriving and diverse community of professional instrument makers: *The World of Musical Instrument Makers: A Guided Tour.* His most recent book, a follow-up to *A Guitar Maker's Canvas*, titled *Grand Complications--50 Guitars and 50 Stories by Inlay Artist Grit Laskin* was published in 2015.



The press attaché had a farewell party in her honour at Canada House in 1973 before she returned to Toronto to launch Global Television network, the Metro Toronto Zoo, and work

on her first film, which led to more than 100 other film productions which took her around the world.

She has worked with Sofia Loren, Julianne Moore, Matt Damon, Robin Williams, Ben Affleck, Viggo Mortensen, Jenifer Aniston, Jennifer Lopez, Robert Redford, Jeremy Irons, and the Olsen Twins among many others. 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The Paratrooper's Girl Jerry Amernic



The Paratrooper's Girl is a novel about war and racial tension woven through a love story. After the Allied invasion of D-Day two unlikely lovers find themselves caught in the throes of the bloodshed, trying to survive as they wrestle with the ongoing intrusions of the Battle of Normandy and the girl's disapproving family.


Joe Resnick is an Allied paratrooper, a member of the 1st Canadian Parachute Battalion which is the first unit from his country to set foot in Germanoccupied France. He is dropped into the Normandy countryside hours before the invasion on the beaches begins. While many men are lost in the operation the Canadians manage to win an early victory against the Germans in the village of Varaville and there Joe meets Maria Marcos. Though of very different backgrounds the two fall in love at a time of turmoil and desperation that will bring death to their doorstep.

She was born in Greece and raised in England, but moved to France with her family before the war. And then came the occupation. Maria is a server at a chateau taken over by a German regiment, and with her parents must house and feed the officer and his men who have become their oppressors. The story begins with the D-Day invasion of June 6, 1944 but not on the beaches – this is about the paratroopers – and continues through the balance of the war. It includes the Battle of the Bulge and the drop over the Rhine right into the heart of Nazi Germany. In August, 1945 Joe's victorious battalion finally returns home but only at great cost, both for him and his precious Maria.

Jerry Amernic has been a newspaper reporter and columnist, feature writer for magazines, editor and teacher of writing at several community colleges in Ontario, and a media consultant. His first novel Gift of the Bambino got great reviews in Canada and the United States. His other novels, both of them historical, are The Last Witness and QUMRAN and they garnered strong reviews. He is also the author of several non-fiction books including Victims: The Orphans of Justice, and DUTY – the Life of a Cop which is the memoir of Julian Fantino. His latest book is the culmination of years of research on baseball legend Babe Ruth. Outside Sean McCammon



Emotional and uplifting, Outside is the story of a teacher's escape to Japan from classroom, country, and self in the wake of a small-town Ontario tragedy. David Woods, a first-year teacher, shares his grade-4 students' passion for nature and their reluctance to be hemmed in by classroom walls. He pushes the boundaries of risk and the constraints of school board policy, leading his class on outdoor adventures with hooting owls, curious stream creatures, and maple syrup making. Then, during a seemingly innocuous field trip, a fateful decision leads to disastrous consequences, not just for himself but many around him. Consumed by guilt, and desperate to make sense of the seemingly random incident, David flees to Japan, going to ground with a group of Western ESL teachers in a Kyoto boarding house.


As the tragedy is recalled, a parallel narrative finds David drawn into the chaotic lives of his boardinghouse companions. The group, including a food-connoisseur deejay, a crude karate student, and an Israeli draft dodger, drag David into experiences that offer hope, love, and the possibility of redemption. In a city cloaked in the ancient the ancient trappings of Buddhism and Shintoism, David Woods struggles to draw meaning from his surroundings and experiences before being called home to answer for his actions.

Sean McCammon, taught English in Japan before returning to Canada to earn a teaching degree. He has been an outdoor education teacher in Kitchener-Waterloo for twenty years, a job that has called on him to be a beekeeper, a maple syrup producer, and a cross-country skier. Sean McCammon is also a musician and songwriter, who has released a CD, Songs From the Sugar Bush, and is working on his next project, about beekeeping, tentatively titled A Bee CD.

The Wig-Maker Janet Gallant and, Sharon Thesen



A powerful tale of violence, grief, resilience, and transformation, told in the voice of Janet Gallant, transcribed and lineated as a long poem by Sharon Thesen, *The Wig-Maker* gathers and weaves together themes and incidents that accumulate toward "the moan" of racism, sexual abuse, maternal abandonment, suicide, mental illness, and addiction.

Though the subject-matter ranges from a lengthy first-person account of sufferings both personal and cultural, historic and current, the pulse of the telling ultimately led to healing and reconciliation. Almost by magic — certainly with the assistance of the uncanny — the 18-month long process of Gallant's telling/Thesen's listening-writing resulted in Gallant's discovery of her true genetic, and social, identity. In the early part of her story Janet longs to know the reasons that her mother abandoned the family when Gallant was three years old, leaving four young children with their abusive father.

She also wants to know what turned her father into "the monster" he had become. Her mother, Valerie Johnson, is Black and grew up in the Black community of Wildwood, Alberta; her Canadian serviceman father, Tom McCrate, grew up in Irish-Catholic poverty in Nova Scotia. As a biracial child, Janet was unaware until she was eleven years old that her mother was Black; nor did she know until very recently that Tom McCrate was not her biological father.

The twists and turns of the narrative gather a range of topics and incidents; the human hair industry, Black immigration to Alberta and Saskatchewan in the early 1900's, maternal abandonment, the stresses of military life, adoption search websites, the suicide of Gallant's teenage brother, the sudden death of her young husband, the stress-disorder of alopecia, and the loneliness of surviving all this but never finding answers. But some important answers have been given and received as a result of Gallant's research being inspired by the mysteriously healing process of the telling itself.

"The Wig-Maker" is Janet Gallant's song; her story comes to life in Sharon Thesen's poem.


Janet Gallant, the wig-maker, began their collaboration when they became friendsafter her relocation to Lake Country, Gallant and Sharon Thesen, neighbours at first, became friends. Kelowna. Three of Sharon Thesen's previous books have been finalists for the Governor–General's Award for Literature — The Good Bacteria (2006), The Beginning of the Long Dash (1987) and Confabulations (1984).

In 1898, Doctor Edward Byrne slips on the ice of the Arcturus glacier in the Canadian Rockies and slides into a crevasse, wedged upside down nearly sixty feet below the surface. As he fights losing consciousness, a stray beam of sunlight illuminates the ice in front of him and Byrne sees something in the blue-green radiance that will forever link him to the ancient glacier. In this moment, his life's purpose becomes uncovering the mystery of the icefield that almost was his tomb. Along the way, he encounters similarly fixated individuals, each immersed in their own quest: the healer and storyteller Sara; the bohemian travel writer Freya Becker; the entrepreneur Trask; the poet Hal Rowan; and Elspeth, greenhouse keeper and Byrne's lover.

First published in 1995, Wharton's *Icefields* is an astonishing historical novel set in a mesmerizing literary landscape, one that is constantly being altered by the surging and retreating glacier and unpredictable weather. Here--where characters are pulled into deep chasms of ice as well as the stories and histories they tell one another--is a vivid, daring, and crisply written book that reveals the human spirit, loss, myth, and elusive truths. This updated Landmark Edition includes an author interview with Smaro Kamboureli and an Afterword by award-winning writer Suzette Mayr.







A Brief View from the Coastal Suite <u>Karen Hofmann</u>



The reunited Lund siblings, separated as children by Social Services, find that family, whether held together by blood or by choice, can be both a curse and a blessing, an obstacle and a point of connection.

Set in Vancouver during the economically turbulent year of 2008, *A Brief View from the Coastal Suite* explores the Lunds' differing values in respect to relationships, money, and environment - all markers for a materialistic society that is becoming increasingly inhospitable. Cleo struggles to find time for her challenging job as an architectural designer and for the demands of her family; Mandalay, an artist and single parent, tries to raise her twin sons uncontaminated by the materialistic values of their lawyer father; and Cliff attempts to run a landscape company with his spoiled younger brother, Ben, and to accommodate the ever-increasing demands of his Estonian mail-order bride.



Edinburgh, 1917: Headstrong Highland lass Mary Stewart is a vibrant woman forced into the world's oldest profession in order to provide for her ailing father and younger sister in the city's Old Town. When her uncle, a well-to-do solicitor with political aspirations, thinks that her presence might impede his lofty ambitions he gives her a way out with dignity: a one-way ticket to the frontier town of Anyox, British Columbia, where nurses are needed to care for injured soldiers returning from the war.

Mary agrees to depart Scotland and leaves her sister in the care of her uncle, but finds that a past like hers is not easy to escape, and that living on the frontier has more challenges than even the darkest streets of Old Town. She must survive by her quick intelligence, but that is a quality that few women were allowed to reveal.

Danial Neil's historical epic *Dominion of Mercy* combines the gritty feel and attention to detail of HBO's *Deadwood* with the Canadian sensibility of Guy Vanderhaeghe's frontier trilogy.



Light on a Part of the Field

In his evocative debut novel, Light on a Part of the Field, Kevin Holowack introduces us to a family grappling with artistic ambition, mental illness, and rifts that may not be possible to mend. Set in B.C. and Alberta in the 1960s and 1970s, this is a novel of finely observed vignettes offering a refracted look at art and family in the Canadian West. A young artist, Ruth, and her obsessive husband are struck by lightning, an experience that throws their lives into a universe of intense beauty and angst. Years later, Ruth lives on a farm her husband bought before his mysterious disappearance, and she creates idyllic but unremarkable paintings to cope with her confusion and loss. Then, without warning, her eldest daughter Gayle is love-struck by a travelling stranger and runs off to Edmonton where she too must contend with poverty, sickness, and her father's upsetting legacy. Meanwhile, farm-bound Ruth becomes more frantic in her work and begins longing for human contact as her house and animals disintegrate around her.

As Gayle and Ruth seek new ways of connecting in order to remedy their unsettling family legacy, they begin a complicated process of renewal and must decide whether they can reconcile despite all the pain they have caused one another.

This new adventure story set in Canada's Arctic will remind you very much of Bill Bryson.

"It was going to be the trip of a lifetime – the perfect adventure for two wannabe explorers only recently graduated from law school about to enter the corporate legal world. But this was no all-inclusive, sun-drenched, cocktail sipping, beach party type trip. That wasn't for us. We were made of hardier stuff. We were off to explore Canada's Arctic. It was to be our last hurrah, a journey to the great white north, land of mystique, intrigue, and danger, only slightly shaded by tales of those who went before us who succumbed to the harshness of the environment. We would pitch our tent on top of permafrost rather than sleep in fancy hotels - no computers, cell phones or internet. All social interactions would be in real time face-to-face. It would be a test of our inner fortitude. We were made of frontier stock."

"Armed with too much arrogance and the certain conviction, "how hard can this be?", my friend Sebastien and I were saved more by luck and good fortune than any outdoors skills "we thought we had.

We were right about one thing though: it turned out to be one hell of an odyssey to the ends of the Earth.

None of our pre-planning counted for much. But before we were through, we somehow managed to drive a 25-year-old rust bucket car that we bartered for a can of coke and a steak 1,500 kilometers to the tip of the Northwest Territories. We canoed the Arctic Ocean – or at least tried to, before being defeated by 4-foot waves, howling winds, mosquito armies, and temperatures that fluctuate more in a day than GameStop shares. As hypothermia beckoned, we were stranded miles from anything resembling civilization, 150 kilometers from nowhere.

But just when things seemed hopeless as we huddled under our flipped canoe for shelter, a solitary figure appeared out of the mist, walking the rain swept, barren shoreline, heading in our direction. Our rescuer wasn't a mirage. He was an Inuit man, who luckily for us, chose that moment in time to be at his traditional whaling camp, just down the shore from where we were stranded. His invitation to join him

is what saved us. Living with his Inuit family, and our journey into the harsh desolate land that

can be the Canadian Arctic, took us from the brink of disaster to a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. It was a lesson in survival. But It was also the chance to live amongst a culture few ever witness. The unexpected helping hand of numerous strangers and my enduring, yet at times tumultuous, relationship with Sebastien were some of the ingredients that went into this buffet of arctic adventures.

Good fortune? Fate? Destiny? Why were we so lucky when other arctic wanderers weren't? How do a people who survive in a land that can be such a hostile place, thrive in that same environment? How can two smart, well-educated, well-traveled, and well-prepared men be saved over and over by good luck rather than good brains, all the while learning the hard truth that the must-have ingredient to success is a sense of community. Appreciating life, and the raw feeling of simply being alive, are just some of the reasons why "Leave Your Plans Behind" is the real-life story that I need to tell.

Canadians Who have followed the news about the covid-19pandemic will recognize the names of doctors Lisa Barrett, Isaac Bogoch, Zain Chagla, Sumon Chakrabarti, Susy Hota, Srinivas Murthy and Lynora Saxinger-seven remarkable doctors who found themselves in the spotlight during a remarkably challenging year. While dealing with their own personal concerns about the worsening pandemic and their busy medical practices, the doctors profiled in Going Viral volunteered their time and offered their expertise in hundreds of media interviews, providing calm, clear and independent analysis.


Hanomansing talks to them about what inspired them to become doctors and what led them to specialize in infectious diseases and then take on this very public role. The doctors discuss the moment the pandemic became very real to them and speak candidly about what it was like when infections raged out of control in Italy and then New York City, leaving doctors at Canadian hospitals to wonder what might be next. And they explain the sense of duty they felt to step into the media glare, even as public anxiety and skepticism sometimes turned into hostility and social media made them easy to contact and, sometimes, easy targets. And for anyone who's been asked to offer their expertise to the media, they have advice on how to answer the call.There are a few silver linings in the covid storm. One of them is how these doctors put science front and centre and became public symbols of trust and hope. As they prepare to return to their private careers, they respond to Hanomansing's invitation to reflect on lessons learned and their concerns about the next pandemic.

Sightseers & Scholars: History Scientific Travellers In The Golden Age Of Natural History Stephen R. Bown



Sightseers and Scholars provides portraits of the explorers and naturalists who sought to explore the New World in the pre-Darwinian Age. The late 18th and early 19th centuries in Europe and America saw the dawn of a golden age of science in which society energetically sought to quantify, categorize, and rationally explain the world. The accurate cataloguing of nature was one of the goals of the age, and most plants and animals known today were collected, classified, and named in a great frenzy of scientifically-motivated exploration.

Until the publication in 1859 of Darwin's *The Origin of Species*, it was believed that there was a finite number of species on the planet and through diligent effort all of nature might be collected and then studied. *Sightseers and Scholars* profiles nine important naturalists-both dedicated professionals and amateurs-who set off for what is now North and South America to discover and document the natural wonders they found there.

Their stories of adventure are punctuated with hardship, both in finding the financing to get their ventures off the ground, and the vagaries of the elements once they reached the New World, be it North or South America. Despite the odds, these explorers, either travelling with artists or as artists themselves, chronicled their adventures in both words and pictures, providing a unique portrait of the natural world in North, South and Central America before it became widely settled. Many of the species observed or discovered still bear the names of the explorers who discovered them (the Stellar Sea Lion, Douglas Fir, Townsend`s Finch). Written with insight, the sometimes wry, always fascinating, text entertains the modern reader with the adventures of: William Bartram, Alexander Von Humboldt, Charles Waterton, Prince Maximillian of Wied, David Douglas, John Townsend, John Richardson, Henry Bates and John Powell.



Scurvy: History How a Surgeon, a Mariner, and a Gentleman Solved the Greatest Medical Mystery of the Age of Sail Stephen Bown




A lively recounting of how three determined individuals overcame the constraints of 18th century thinking to solve the greatest medical mystery of their era. The cure for scurvy ranks among the greatest of military successes, yet its impact on history has mostly been ignored. Stephen Bown, in this engaging and often gripping book, searches back to the earliest recorded appearance of scurvy in the 16th century, to the 18th century, when the disease was at its gum-shred, bone-snapping worst, to the early 19th century, when the preventative was finally put into service. Brown introduces us, among others, to James Lind, navy surgeon and medical detective, whose research on the disease spawned the implementation of the cure; Captain James Cook, who successfully avoided scurvy on his epic voyages; and Gilbert Blane, whose social status and charisma won over the British Navy and saved England.

Gidal Sixty Letters and Sixty Photos, the Unusual Friendship of Yosef Wosk and Tim Gidal, Yosef Wosk



An intimate selection of letters between Tim Gidal, a pioneering force in photojournalism, and scholar and art collector Yosef Wosk. "although four decades separated us, Tim and I were inexorably drawn together through the magnetic forces of art and culture; travel; history; exile and war; loves and loves lost; writing, teaching and forgetting; collecting and letting it all go."-Yosef Wosk, from the Preface Nachum Tim Gidal, Jewish pioneer of modern photojournalism, was born in Munich in 1909 and died in Jerusalem in 1996. He began taking photographs in the late 1920s, at a time when technological advances made photography equipment more compact and affordable than ever before. With his handheld Leica, Gidal was able to travel in interwar Europe, capturing rare images of Polish Jews prior to the annihilation of WW II.

Yosef Wosk first encountered Gidal's work in the photo "Night of the Kabbalist" in a magazine in 1991 and, captivated, was determined to meet the photographer on an upcoming sabbatical in Israel. However, most of the trip passed without any signs that his search would be successful. One day, Wosk saw a small poster on a lamppost showcasing Israeli photography in a local gallery, and through the proprietor, finally met the person who he would later consider his close friend, teacher, and confidant—Nachum Tim Gidal. On one level, the letters—selected from the hundreds the correspondents exchanged over two decades—memorialize Gidal as an artist, scholar, historian of photography and "hero among the Jewish people." However, they also capture the essence of Gidal and Wosk's friendship. Readers will be drawn into a rich conversation touching on philosophy, advice, personal issues, reading recommendations and more, with Gidal always brilliant, witty and cantankerous and Wosk curious, appreciative and intelligent. This fascinating and beautifully designed volume will appeal to those with an interest in modern Jewish history as well as anyone interested in early 20th-century photography.

Yosef Wosk is a rabbi, philanthropist, educator, author, scholar, community leader and prominent figure in BritishColumbia and spent 15 years as a director at the Continuing Studies program at Simon Fraser University. There, he founded multiple initiatives and is currently an adjunct professor in the Humanities department. Wosk is a member of the Order of British Columbia, has received both the Queen's Golden and Diamond Jubilee Medals, and was awarded the Order of Canada in 2020.
